

## **Article Correction Policy**

### **Policy Regarding Corrections in Print and Online Versions**

The definitive and conclusive version of an article is the one published online. Despite the possibility of rectifying this version, our policy, in line with other publishers, generally refrains from doing so, except under extremely limited circumstances.

We are solely equipped to rectify typographical errors concerning author names, affiliations, article titles, abstracts, and keywords. In such instances, an erratum or corrigendum is required to maintain a record elucidating the distinctions between the online and print iterations.

Should there be a significant error impacting scientific accuracy or potentially tarnishing your or the journal's reputation, we reserve the right to publish a correction. However, we abstain from publishing corrections that do not materially influence the contribution or significantly impede the reader's comprehension, such as spelling or grammatical errors.

### **Addenda**

An addendum is a notification of additional information peer-reviewed for inclusion in a paper, often prompted by a reader's request for clarification. The addenda does not conflict with the original publication; however, if the author unintentionally excluded significant information available at the time, it may be included in an addendum following peer review.

Addenda are infrequently published and only when deemed essential by the editors for enhancing the reader's comprehension of a significant aspect of the published work.

### **Corrigenda**

A corrigendum serves as a notice of a significant error identified by the authors of the article. All authors must sign the corrigenda before submission for publication.

In instances where co-authors hold conflicting opinions, the editors will seek guidance from independent peer reviewers to determine the necessary amendment. Any dissenting authors will be duly noted in the published version of the corrigendum.

## **Errata**

If a critical error arises during the production of a journal article, impacting the publication record, the scientific integrity, or the reputations of the authors or the journal, an erratum will be issued. This encompasses errors of omission, such as neglecting to implement factual proof corrections requested by authors within the journal's stipulated deadline and policies.

Errata are not typically published for typographical errors, except when a seemingly simple mistake holds significant weight, such as an incorrect unit. Any significant errors in figures or tables are rectified by publishing a new corrected version as an erratum. Republishing the figure or table is only done at the discretion of the editor if deemed necessary.
